Keynote Speaker



Michael Bury has a decade of nursing experience where he has worked in medical surgical, Medical Intensive Care, and Post Anesthesia Care units. Additionally, he has administrative experience from working as the pulmonary transplant coordinator and the Clinical Team Lead for the Perianesthesia Department at Duke University Hospital.

Currently, Michael is a Lieutenant in the United States Navy Reserves as the Nurse Corps Officer where he supervises enlisted members and fellow nursing officers and executes bedside ICU care at Naval and joint service medical facilities. He also works as a clinical instructor and course coordinator in the UNC Chapel Hill School of Nursing where he is the faculty advisor for the Association of Nursing Students and Aspiring Critical Care Nurses Student Association. He is also attending Duke University and expects to complete his Doctorate in Nursing Practice in August of 2021.

Beyond his evident dedication to mentoring nursing students, Michael also spent time in the Spring and Summer of 2020 deployed to New York City to care for COVID-19 patients.

Reimagining a Socially Just Society



Dr. Brigit Carter, Associate Professor and Associate Dean for Diversity and Inclusion, joined the Duke University School of Nursing (DUSON) in 2010. From 2015-2018 she served as the Director of the DUSON Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) program. She has served as the Academic Coordinator for the Health Equity Academy and the preceding grant, Making a Difference in Nursing. Dr. Carter also teaches in both the Doctorate of Nursing Practice, Master of Nursing Science and Accelerated BSN Programs.

Dr. Carter earned her BSN at North Carolina Central University (NCCU) in 1998, a Master of Science in Nursing Education from University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 2002 and PhD in Nursing from University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 2009.

Dr. Carter's clinical research focuses on nursing care of premature infants (<1500 grams) with feeding intolerance and identification of measurable methods for early detection of feeding intolerance. She continues her clinical practice as a staff nurse in the Duke University Hospital Intensive Care Nursery, where she has 21 years' experience.

Dr. Carter was selected for the 2017 inaugural George Washington University Leaders for Health Equity Fellowship. She is currently an Atlantic Fellow for Health Equity and serves as a Senior Fellow Advisory Board member. Dr. Carter is also a 2017-2018 Duke Teaching for Equity fellow.

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Dr. Carter retired from the U. S. Navy as a Commander after 28 years of service (including 9 on active duty) in January 2018..

Dr. McMillian-Bohler received a BSN from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, an MSN in Nurse-Midwifery from Vanderbilt University, and a PhD in Nursing Education from Villanova University. Currently an Assistant clinical professor at Duke University School of Nursing, she teaches Health Promotion and Perinatal Nursing in the pre-professional and Master's Degree programs. Passionate about teaching and helping others achieve excellence in teaching, Her program of research aims to identify how master teachers create powerful learning experiences for students.

She has presented nationally, regionally, and locally on the subject of faculty development, and has and published on the subjects of inclusive teaching strategies, addressing microaggressions, and student engagement.

As a Certified Nurse-Midwife, she provided full scope women's health care in Charleston South Carolina, Nashville, Tennessee, and Louisville, Kentucky. Jacqui is also interested in global women's health issues. She has precepted nursing students in China, South America, and the Philippines. Jacqui's notable recognitions include the Alumni Award for Clinical Achievement from Vanderbilt University for her work with migrant workers and pregnant teens in rural South Carolina, the American College of Nurse-Midwives Vanderbilt Nurse-Midwifery Faculty of the Year, and the Kentucky African American Nurses Association Educator of the Year Award. She was also honored with a research Award from the Alpha Nu Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau at Villanova University.
